### Body Art

Inspect body art facilities (tattoo, piercing, branding, permanent cosmetics) to ensure safety. Call to report unlicensed or unsanitary body art procedures.

### Campgrounds

Inspect temporary and permanent campgrounds to ensure safe and sanitary conditions.

### Day Care Inspections

Inspect facilities as requested by the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services to ensure a safe environment and safe water supply and sewage disposal.

### Environmental Education

Conduct educational outreach on radon, food safety, recycling, water quality and more; coordinate *Issues of the Environment* public radio program on 89.1 FM-WEMU.

### Food Service Sanitation

Inspect food service establishments every 180 days; investigate foodborne illness reports; respond to food service establishment complaints; inspect temporary food establishments prior to serving food to the public. Call to report a foodborne illness or restaurant complaint.

### Groundwater Monitoring

Partner with local governments and citizens to develop policies and strategies to address 1,4-dioxane and other groundwater contamination.

### Housing Complaints

Investigate complaints and coordinate remediation of unsanitary housing and environmental conditions. Call to report these situations.

### Onsite Sewage

Conduct soil evaluations to determine the suitability of onsite sewage treatment; issue sewage permits; train and certify sewage system installation and repair contractors and certified maintenance providers.

### Onsite Water Supply

Issue well permits; monitor Type II water supply facilities to ensure safety and compliance.

### Pollution Prevention

Inspect facilities that store, manufacture or use hazardous, toxic or polluting materials, ensuring that these substances are used and disposed of properly.

### Radon Program

Supply kits to residents to test their homes for radon. Call or visit our office to purchase a radon kit.

### Recreational Water

Inspect all public swimming pools annually; sample public swimming pools biweekly; sample and monitor public bathing beaches weekly during the summer.

### Time of Sale Inspection

Review inspection reports to ensure properties being sold have functioning well and sewage systems; train and certify inspectors.

### Water Testing Services

Supply water testing bottles to residents to test private wells for bacteria, arsenic and other contaminants. Visit our office to purchase testing bottles.

### Sexual Health Services

(734) 544-6840

Sexually transmitted disease (STD) testing and treatment; free HIV testing and counseling; rapid or anonymous HIV testing; PrEP (Pre-exposure prophylaxis), a prevention option for people who are at high risk of getting HIV; free partner notification services; pregnancy testing; and birth control counseling. Call to schedule, or walk-in Thursdays from 1-4pm. Free pregnancy tests on Wednesdays.

### Animal Bites and Rabies

Call to report animal bites and exposure to bats. We can consult about the need for rabies vaccination after an animal bite or other exposure. We also coordinate any needed rabies testing of animals.

### Children's Special Health Care Services

Care coordination and case management for children and adults with eligible medical conditions. The program can also assist with the specialty medical care needed to confirm a diagnosis.

### Communicable Disease

Information, education, investigation and reporting of infectious diseases. Tuberculosis (TB) services include diagnosis and treatment of latent and active TB. Tuberculin skin tests available by appointment.

### Dental Clinic

### Health Promotion

Collaborative initiatives support access to healthy foods, safe places for physical activity and work to prevent tobacco use, suicide and substance abuse. Programs include Prescription for Health, Washtenaw Alive and enforcement of the Clean Indoor Air Regulation. Technical assistance on community engagement, policy and environmental changes to support health and prevent disease is also available.

### Hearing and Vision

(734) 544-6786

Free hearing and vision screening for individuals under 21 and special education students up to age 26. Most screenings take place in schools, preschools and day cares. Office appointments also available.

### Immunizations

Vaccines prevent disease. Public health nurses provide education, administer vaccines and work with schools, providers and community partners to support vaccination. Nurses also provide science-based education sessions to parents or guardians requesting non-medical immunization waivers. Call for fees, vaccine availability and scheduling.

### Lead Program

Public health nurses provide follow up, education and referrals when a child's blood lead test confirms an elevated lead level. Lead testing available by request. Home visits with an Environmental Health professional are available when needed.

### Maternal Infant Health Program

A home visiting program for pregnant women and infants with Medicaid insurance. Services include education, service coordination, support and referrals provided by a social worker, nurse and dietitian.

### Medical Examiner

(734) 232-1127

Located at the University of Michigan morgue, the Medical Examiner investigates any sudden, violent, unexpected or suspicious deaths that occur in Washtenaw County. Autopsy reports may be requested by contacting the office. There is a \$25 fee.

### Partnerships, Data, Strategies

The Health Improvement Plan (HIP) is a collaborative community health assessment and planning effort. The aim is to improve the health of *all* county residents. HIP collects comprehensive data, including a countywide health survey every five years. Partners use the data to develop, implement and evaluate our local community health improvement plan.

### Public Health Emergency Preparedness

Emergency preparedness information and training, including presentations and consultation for families, individuals and community organizations is available. Residents interested in helping in an emergency can apply to volunteer with the Washtenaw County Medical Reserve Corps. Call or visit our website.

### Washtenaw Health Plan (WHP)

### West Nile Virus (WNV)

The information line is available when needed to answer questions about WNV or other potential health threats. When activated, callers can report dead birds and listen to recorded information.

### Women, Infants & Children (WIC)

Women, Infants and Children (WIC) provides supplemental food and nutrition education to pregnant women and children up to five years of age. WIC also has trained breastfeeding peer counselors who provide support and guidance to breastfeeding moms. Call for an appointment, clinic locations or more information.
